One of the fun parts of showing at the regional championships is the opportunity they provide to get amazing horse show photos. This year at the Region 6 championships, however, I got something I was not expecting in a venue where the photographer is always run off her legs: some images so personal and so 'us' that I choke up every time I look at them.

Monkey came into my life as a yearling. I had not gone looking for a Lipizzan, but had a connection to this one and that connection comes through loud and clear in the photographs Jessica took of us last September. Over the past twelve years Monkey and I have progressed from unbacked baby horse and inexperienced amateur rider who dreamed of developing a horse to FEI-level competition, to the pair you see on the cover. What the picture highlights, and the reason it makes me feel emotional, is the most important and intangible outcome of this process: the relationship that has emerged over years of dedicated partnership. Jessica's aim in her equine photography—and what she achieved in the pictures she took of us in the moments of repose between our classes—reflects her artistry in capturing what she describes as 'real moments, shot with patience and compassion' that make visible 'deep horse-human connections.'





LIF Judges Clinic

One of the most valuable options that is presented at the LIF is the opportunity to attend the Judges Training. This year it was presented on the two days prior to the LIF General Assembly. The format has remained consistent over the years, with the participants broken into two groups. One group consists of individuals that are already approved LIF judges at the International level, and the other group comprises individual breeders, owners and those who eventually wish to seek judging licensing in the future from their National Breeding Society. This split format allows each group to work with their peers, comparing scores, having detailed discussion appropriate to the level of training of the group and learning not only from our instructor, but from each other. And best of all, both groups were presented with horses from the outstanding herd at Lipica, both mares and stallions of varying ages, types and bloodlines.

Our group of lower-level judges was led by Dr. Max Dobretsberger, former Breeding Director of Piber and an International FEI driving competitor. His years of experience were so appreciated by the group, and his encouraging attitude, good nature and depth of understanding of the Lipizzan breed made all the participants feel more confident as they developed a clearer understanding of Lipizzan conformation, gaits, and type. It was such a wonderful opportunity to be presented with what seemed to be an unlimited number of Lipizzans of so many various shapes and sizes, something those of us from countries with smaller Lipizzan populations were thrilled to experience. One of my favorite parts of the entire experience was the comradery of the group as we became comfortable with each other, and stretched across the language barrier to compare notes and discuss the finer points of Lipizzan evaluations. And not surprisingly, our love and devotion to these horses overcame our varied backgrounds and experiences, filling the arena with great discussion and laughter.

A World Class Experience: 2022 USLF Symposium and Breed Evaluations

Congratulations and heartfelt thanks to the leadership of USLF and Tempel Farms, and to their volunteers and staff, for organizing, hosting, and managing a spectacular 2022 USLF Symposium and Breed Evaluations. Every aspect of the September 24-25 event—the venue, the horses, the programming, the food, the camaraderie—all blended for a genuinely welcoming, hospitable, warm, and thoroughly delicious immersion into the Lipizzaner realm. For all else that it brilliantly was, it was also a reunion of Lipizzan lovers, restoratively charged with a cheerful buzz of reconnection and joy. From beginning to end, we were giddy with being together

It was a dream trip for me to attend the two-day event at Tempel Farms, on Wadsworth Road in Old Mill Creek, Illinois.

About an hour's drive from Chicago, Tempel Farms' nearly 7,000 acres of glorious, rolling green horse country, white fences, and beautiful Lipizzans dotting the expanse, was breathtaking. Upon arrival, I took a long walk across the expanse, stretching my legs and unwinding with every step and breath.

It is a service and a priority of the USLF to organize an evaluation event regularly so that purebred Lipizzan breeding stallions and mares in North America can be scored by certified judge examiners. For various reasons—recession and COVID among them—the evaluations have been thwarted since the last event in 2018.

The International Lipizzan Federation (LIF), of which USLF is a member, trains and certifies judge examiners. The judge observes and scores each individual stallion or mare according to the internationally recognized breed standard. The objective is to assess the individual for its potential for preserving the integrity of the Lipizzan breed.

Our Tempel Farms headquarters for greeting, meeting, and eating was the perfectly suited and situated Guest House; I was not alone in wanting to take up permanent residence there! The historic house is open, spacious, abundant with picture windows, and set at a vantage point to take in the gorgeous surrounding greenspace, geese, and horses, as far as the eye could see. Evaluations were held in outdoor and indoor arenas.

Over delicious, hearty meals presented buffet style and between formal sessions and evaluations, was a constant buzz of conversation, around friendly tables, where we circulated at will, joining in, meeting up, listening, and sharing questions and stories. Bits and pieces of Lipizzan lore surfaced and circulated amongst us. One memorable example was getting to see, courtesy of Tempel Smith's son, Tim Smith, the family home movie footage (circa 1958), documenting the historic oceanic transport of the 20 Lipizzans Tempel Smith first brought to the United States. His intent was to institute the classic ways of breeding, raising, and training Lipizzan horses.


What an honor and pleasure it was that Dr. Yvonne Peeters, DVM (Netherlands), presented at the Symposium and conducted the evaluations. A member of the LIF Breeding Committee and certified evaluation judge, Dr. Peeters delivered an interactive overview of the breed, its history, characteristics, and the evaluation criteria and process. This served as a helpful backdrop for the practicum of one-onone evaluations that dominated Saturday afternoon and Sunday. Supremely experienced and knowledgeable, Dr. Peeters is delightful, and approachable. She and her spouse, Appie Noordkamp (also a DVM), were fully engaged in every aspect of the gathering. Their warmth and easy manner flowed naturally into the relaxed and happy Lipizzan family reunion atmosphere.

For me, the learning that happened with practice evaluations and then by observing Dr. Peeters evaluate individual stallions and mares is unparalleled. Expert, practical, handson, with the attendant questions and conversations from the gallery, the evaluations were completely engrossing. I find myself drawing from the evaluation experience daily as I observe and learn about my own family of Lipizzans.

One of the highlights of the two-day event was the exclusive spotlight performance of the Tempel Farm Lipizzans. Here one could see the results of humane and expert handling and training in the harmony of horse and rider. The horses were beautiful, graceful, strong, and elegant and the only way to be closer to them would be to have them in hand. The performance was world-class exquisite.

The sight was a feast for the eyes, with riders in traditional dress on their beautiful mounts. A standout were the animated, happy, and healthy-looking hounds.

The organization and management of all aspects of the two days seemed effortless, though it couldn't possibly have been. Still, it flowed, from what I could tell, for all 55 or so of us there. In the words of fellow participant and fabled Lipizzan steward, Barbara Gjerset, "Everything about it left me with such a wonderful feeling; it renewed my faith in life. What I especially enjoyed was the mild weather, that the horses were happy, and that the handlers were so kind and connected to their horses....and the quality of the horses evaluated...there wasn't a horse I wouldn't take home."







Going for Bronze with Pluto Garcia

It's impossible to talk about Lipizzans without history and bloodlines being a part of the conversation. The rich history of the breed is an integral part of all of our missions in working with these horses. Careful breeding over hundreds of years has created bloodlines with very distinct characteristics and personality traits. In my opinion, it is most evident in this breed of

In 2020, I started working with Lipizzans, and immediately I was captivated by the personalities of the horses. Anyone who has worked with Lipizzans knows that their charisma is on an entirely different level than any other type of horse. I grew up riding Hunter/Jumper competitively, competing at the largest shows in the country on the A Circuit. I graduated from the University of Southern California in May of 2020, in the midst of the pandemic job shortage, and my career plans changed dramatically. I had never planned on going pro, despite my love for the sport, and I certainly never planned on becoming a dressage rider. I was fortunate enough to connect with Esther Buonanno, the Program Director at Tempel Lipizzans, and began as a working student in July of 2020. I was later hired on as a Rider, and Esther and I set a goal to achieve my USDF Bronze Medal. Needless to say, the Lipizzans have stolen my heart.

In the spring of last year, Esther got word that a horse born at Tempel, Pluto Garcia (nicknamed "Samson"), was in need of a career change. She is incredible about keeping up with every Tempel Lipizzan, as her love and care for every foal born on the farm is indescribable and her ability to remember each and every one is admirable. Of course, she welcomed Samson home with open arms. When he stepped off of the trailer a few weeks later, I had no idea how much this horse would teach me.

Samson is a 12-year-old bay Lipizzan gelding who was donated as a young horse to BraveHearts as a yearling, a local therapeutic riding center with Lipizzans close to its heart. There, Samson received incredible care and training under Director Meggan Hill-McQueeney as a western reining horse. His sweet demeanor, eagerness to learn, and bond with his rider are testaments to his high-quality upbringing by the staff at Bravehearts, as well as the personality traits that are carried down through his bloodlines.

Samson's lines are incredibly important here at Tempel Farms. His sire, Pluto Distinta, is a quadrille horse and beloved schoolmaster imported from Piber Stud. He is a reliable partner who has taught countless riders, from taking care of beginners to showing them the ropes of FEI. His brother, Pluto Gratia, is also a quadrille horse, as well as a staff favorite who has taught me quite a bit; most notably, he is primarily responsible for showing me my love of dressage. On top of talent, intelligence, and desire to please their riders, this family's distinguishing characteristic is having a heart of gold. With these bloodlines, we had high hopes for Samson. He very quickly showed us he would deliver on our expectations. To say he is a special horse would be an understatement.

Samson's training progressed impressively under Trainer Nadalyn Firenz, who did an incredible job laying down the foundations of dressage with him. I rode a public demonstration with him demonstrating training level work. However, it wasn't until the Winter of 2022 that my bond with him became unbreakable. Samson was recovering after developing some confidence issues and suffering from a minor injury when I began working with him daily. I was searching for a horse that I could get scores on for my Bronze Medal. It took a few weeks, but he began to trust me, and it became clear that he was willing to make my dreams a reality.

Going for Bronze cont.

In the Summer of 2022, we had just returned from a horse show at Silverwood, where we had a successful weekend earning our first score. But beyond the achievements of scores and percentages, Samson and I both had a very positive experience, which was more important to me than anything else. It was my first dressage show, first show as a professional, and it was Samson's first time ever at a horse show. I watched a horse who struggled with confidence issues go from a nervous, green horse to a bold show horse in only three days. It is clear more than ever that he has the solid gold heart that runs in his bloodlines. About six months into working at Tempel, I found out that my great uncle was a part of Operation Cowboy and helped save the Lipizzans at the end of WWII, so I guess you could say that the Lipizzan magic is in my blood too.

Samson and I will continue working towards our Bronze Medal scores this summer. It would not be possible without an incredible horse that I am lucky enough to share a bond with, and an amazing program that took a chance on a horse and rider who came to dressage later in life. This journey would not be possible without Esther Buonanno, the incredible team at Tempel Lipizzans, Nadalyn Firenz for her mentorship, the staff at BraveHearts who did an incredible job raising Samson, and of course, Samson, who tries his heart out for me every day. Thank you all so very much for such an incredible opportunity and bond with a horse who is teaching me so many important lessons.

Conversano and Austria: United by the Lipizzans! May 2022

A delegation from the Lipizzan International Federation (LIF) came to Conversano, Puglia, Italy, to visit the Conversano Lipizzan horse farm of Francesco Minunni's Terra Terra and to confirm the partnership between Puglia and Austria linked in the name of Lipizzan horses. Dr. Max Dobretsberger, LIF President, Andrea Dobretsberger, rider in international competitions, Franz Eccher, president of the Lipizzan Austria Association, Renate Eccher rider in international competitions, Christian Manz, LIF treasurer, Dorothea Enzenberg, and Professor Gottfried Brem, professor of genetics at the University of Vienna, who has written many books the latest Der Lipizzaner.

Accompanied by Francesco Minunni, they visited his family's farm where the Conversano line is present, one of the six traditional stallion bloodlines of the Lipizzaners. The Lipizzan horse Conversano was born in the stables of the Counts of Conversano Acquaviva d'Aragona in 1767 and in 1774 it was transferred to the imperial stables of Austria in Lipizza. Currently in Conversano and other locations in Puglia there are several breeders of Lipizzan and Murgese horses.

The LIF delegation was received by the Mayor of Conversano Giuseppe Lovascio, the mayor was very satisfied with the visit and announced that the municipal administration of Conversano intends to deepen a collaboration with LIF. This cooperation will certainly contribute to the protection of Lipizzan horses, already recognized as world heritage in various European countries, and confirm the partnership between Puglia and Austria linked in the name of the Lipizzan horses.

The delegation visited the City of Conversano, a city rich in history, the old town founded prior to Roman time, toured the beautiful castle that dates back to early 1100 and many beautiful churches. They enjoyed the local food, nice weather and toured the surrounding cities of Apulia,

includingPolignano, Alberobello, Locorotondo, Ostuni, Matera and the beaches of Apulia.

What is Work on the Long Rein? An Interview with Bill Clements, Head Trainer at the Tempel Lipizzans

By special request from a USLF member, we share some basic information about "work on the long rein." As a classical school of training, Tempel Lipizzans has continued to train and present work on the long rein as is done at most of the classical schools of Europe. It is the culmination of many years of training and is a most moving demonstration of self-carriage and the beauty of the horse.

Tempel Lipizzans most recent star was Pluto III Ambrosia III who charmed thousands of people over the years with what could be considered the ultimate expression of classical training.

Which horse taught you long rein? Neapolitano Primrose

What kind of tack is used? A bridle and long reins

How do you teach them not to kick you? Quiet, confidence and never let them feel scared or too much pressure

What is the difference between the long rein and long-lining? Long-lining is a training method that can be used for piaffe, half steps and working on connection. Work on the Long Rein is the presentation of the finished product in training.

Do you find some horses are different to work on the long rein than under saddle?

Horses act similar to how they are under saddle.

Are Lipizzans particularly well suited for demonstration on the long rein?

Yes because they are smart, gentle and easy to work at the high levels.

How would you describe the long rein?

The art of showing the training of the horse at the highest level, no longer needing the weight or leg aids of the rider. Traditionally the horse is first trained to the Grand Prix levels and then they learn to present this on the long rein with the trainer on the ground.

How do you choose a horse to use for the long rein?

I choose horses that are quiet, relaxed, confident with great strength. It is also helpful for them to be on the smaller side, about 14.3 hands. The horse should be trained under saddle first and have accomplished the height of collection. In other words, he should be willing and able to carry himself with his weight well-balanced on his hind end.

Who is well-suited for long rein?

The best person to perform the long rein is someone with calmness with experience riding. Some people just have a feel for it.

Where did you learn to long rein?

I learned from both Tempel Lipizzans trainers George Williams and Karl Mikolka.




As a young mare, Sarbella's breeder, Jenice Knechtel, had chosen to keep her and started her undersaddle. Sarbella even participated in an Andreas Hausberger clinic! Then, due to an accident, Jenice needed time and space for healing and her small herd of Lipizzans were distributed to friends and associates for caretaking. Sarbella went to live with a non-Lipizzan herd of horses in the Portland, Oregon area. After a couple of years it became clear that Jenice had moved into a phase of life that did not include owning horses and I was contacted to help find aligned homes for a few that had been fostered out, including Sarbella.

Sarbella initially moved in with USLF member Diana Jochim, also in the Portland area, but her large stature (taller than 16hh), giant mare personality and lack of consistent handling for a couple years soon proved not to be a good fit. After visiting Diana and meeting Sarbella, I made the decision to bring this beautiful mare home!

I'll never forget the first time we free lunged her in our arena. She had very strange gaits, and not at all what I would have expected from her conformation. Luckily, our equine body worker had the answer, and after major chiropractic adjustments and time for healing she showed us the stunning Lipizzan movement I had expected. She had obviously been in pain for some time, so it felt wonderful to have been able to provide her with relief and set her up for future success. I was looking forward to riding her, except. . .

Sarbella began to make it very clear that she was ready to move on. She was always compliant, but she didn't connect with me the same way my other horses did. She would also go to the far end of the pasture (quite a distance from the other horses and the barn) and pace the fenceline. I realized she had come to me for a reason (and a season), not a lifetime, and I began to ponder her future.

After conversations with Esther Buonanno, Director of Tempel Farms, Sarbella traveled to Illinois to join the Tempel broodmare herd. This was a good fit for her and her underrepresented genetics were captured as she put some beautiful babies on the ground. In 2020, at the age of 17, Sarbella was retired as a broodmare. Since she was in good health, Esther put her back undersaddle, and in 2021 she moved across the road to live at Trophy Room Stables with her new human, USLF member George McCarthy, where she is well-loved and regularly trail ridden.

This fall, George invited me to come visit and take Sarbella on a trail ride. What a treat to visit this historic stable and spend time with George and Sarbella. I watched as Sarbella's eyes were locked on to George, following his every move. She didn't mind at all demonstrating the tricks he has taught her. It was clear to me that she has *finally* found her forever home.

Super Studs from History: 3160 Neapolitano XIII-8-10 Alnok

Presented by the USLF Historical Committee

3160 Neapolitano XIII-8-10 Alnok was born in Babolna, Hungary in 1950. He was purchased by Tempel Smith and like most stallions, he went to training at a private stable in Austria called Freudenau stables before being imported to the US. This stallion was important in establishing the Neapolitano line at Tempel Farms and in the North American herd. Some important progeny you may find on your pedigree are stallion 230 Neapolitano Fantasca who sired 50 offspring in the US, 212 Sabrina (dam of 416 Maestoso II Sabrina who sired 72 offspring in the US). Also of note, mare 65 Andora produced important breeding stallion 215 Conversano Andora who produced 43 offspring and established Tempel Farms Conversano line.

Super Studs from History will be an ongoing photo project organized by the Historical Committee in which we share images of stallions that can often be found on US Lipizzan pedigrees. It is also a motivation to begin a historical archiving project in which we capture images and video of our current US breeding stock for the future stewards and breeders of the Lipizzan horse. Stay tuned for more on this.



Lipizzan Breeding Traditions, UNESCO Inscription

A moment to celebrate!

On December 1, Lipizzan horse breeding traditions were inscribed in Morocco as a UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity!! This is the result of the dedicated efforts of eight countries working together to ensure the future of the Lipizzan breed: Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Hungary, Italy, Romania, Slovakia, and Slovenia.

From the UNESCO site: "Lipizzan horse breeding has united communities for over 450 years, generating a strong sense of shared identity, including through its specialized vocabulary and the close emotional connection between breeders and horses."

What is UNESCO? According to their website, UNESCO is the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization. It contributes to peace and security by promoting international cooperation in education, sciences, culture, communication and information. UNESCO promotes knowledge sharing and the free flow of ideas to accelerate mutual understanding and a more perfect knowledge of each other's lives.

What is Intangible Cultural Heritage? Also from the UNESCO website: The term 'cultural heritage' has changed content considerably in recent decades, partially owing to the instruments developed by UNESCO. Cultural heritage does not end at monuments and collections of objects. It also includes traditions or living expressions inherited from our ancestors and passed on to our descendants, such as oral traditions, performing arts, social practices, rituals, festive events, knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe or the knowledge and skills to produce traditional crafts.

While fragile, intangible cultural heritage is an important factor in maintaining cultural diversity in the face of growing globalization. An understanding of the intangible cultural heritage of different communities helps with intercultural dialogue, and encourages mutual respect for other ways of life.

The importance of intangible cultural heritage is not the cultural manifestation itself but rather the wealth of knowledge and skills that is transmitted through it from one generation to the next.

Lipizzan horse breeding gets UNESCO heritage status

"One of the eight bloodlines of the Lipizzan horses were kept on a farm in Conversano, in the province of Bari, the breeding of which was recognized as a World Heritage Site by Unesco in the context of the 17th session of the Intangible Cultural Heritage Committee in progress at Rabat in Morocco.

This is the Conversano line, as Coldiretti Puglia makes known, which takes its name from the Apulian municipality. Among the ancestral horses of the Lipizzans, until recently kept in the historic Tarsia Morisco farmhouse, Conversano Tartara stands out in particular, an imposing white stallion used for carriage driving and perfect for dressage so loved by the Habsburg court. In Puglia one of the last breeders of the Conversano breed is Francesco Minunni, who shares his passion for this breed with his son Paolo. There are a total of 403 Lipizzan horses registered in Italy in the herd book kept by Anareai, a member of FedAna. The recognition of The Lipizzan horse breeding tradition, underlines Coldiretti, is the result of a transnational candidacy led by Slovenia and including, in addition to Italy, Austria, Bosnia, Croatia, Hungary, Romania and Slovakia."

Equestrian Safety: Virginia Tech Helmet Study

The 2022 Edition of the Virginia Tech Equestrian Helmet Ratings was recently released. The study looked at around 40 helmets and rated them on 12 criteria. "We rate each equestrian helmet based on the results of 12 impact tests in our laboratory. A pendulum impactor test rig was used to assess these equestrian helmets. We measure linear and rotational acceleration for each impact, which are correlated to concussion risk. These helmets have passed American standards (ASTM F1163, SNELL E2016) and/or European standards (VG1 01.040, PAS 015)." Of particular note, helmets covering many different price points made the Top Six, offering all riders access to affordable head protection.

Tips from the Registrar: Duplicate Certificates

Did you know that if your Lipizzan's original Certificate of Registration is damaged or lost you can request a replacement?

If the original Certificate is damaged and you would like to replace it, you can fill out the short "Duplicate Certificate" form on the "Registry" page of the USLF website, pay the fee of \$25 and mail the damaged Certificate back to the office. The damaged Certificate may be folded to fit in a regular envelope to save on postage. Once the original Certificate is received, you will be issued a brand-new Certificate for your horse.

If the original Certificate has been lost, you will fill out the same form on the "Registry" page, pay the same fee, and then wait for an email from the Registrar with an Affidavit of Lost Certificate of Registration attached for you to sign and return to the office. This document may be scanned and emailed or mailed by USPS.

It is also possible to transfer ownership using the Affidavit of Lost Certificate of Registration so that a transfer may be completed without the extra step of issuing a Certificate to the original owner and then to the new owner.

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
